These panels are particularly critical in identifying organizational issues and social concerns that SPSA members need to keep at the forefront of our collective awareness. And as is our tradition, the SPSA will hold an open Business Meeting on Friday morning. This year's meeting will include the introduction of our new Executive Director, Bob Howard of Georgia State University; the Annual Presentation of Best Paper, Best Book, Best Article, and Career Contribution awards; consideration of changes in the SPSA Constitution; and SPSA elections.

Finally, while urging you to attend these many events, I also hope that you will take the opportunity to experience some of the sites and flavors of New Orleans. It is always a joy to return here. Dr. Howard is currently a Professor of political science at Georgia State University in Atlanta, Georgia. Dr. Howard received his bachelor's degree from Union College in Schenectady, New York, earned a law degree from Suffolk University in Boston, Massachusetts, and a Masters and a PhD in American Politics and Public Law from the State University of New York at Stony Brook. His main research interests are the impact of courts and litigation on social and public policy, and judicial decision making by the Federal Courts. He is the author of numerous articles and books, including *Judging Law and Policy: Courts and Policymaking in the American Political System* and *Getting a Poor Return: Courts, Justice and Taxes*.

An SPSA member since 1994, Dr. Howard has been the Editor of *Justice System Journal* as well as the Editor of the book series *Law, Courts, and Politics*.

You can hear Dr. Howard speak on the future of the SPSA at the panel "Charting the Future of the SPSA: Challenges and Opportunities", which is on Thursday, January 9, from 3:00 to 4:30 in the 8 Block Kitchen. This roundtable, which was organized by the SPSA Membership Development Committee, will focus on the challenges that face our organization, as well as offer solutions and point out opportunities the SPSA has to continue the development of our membership, as well as advance the field of Political Science.

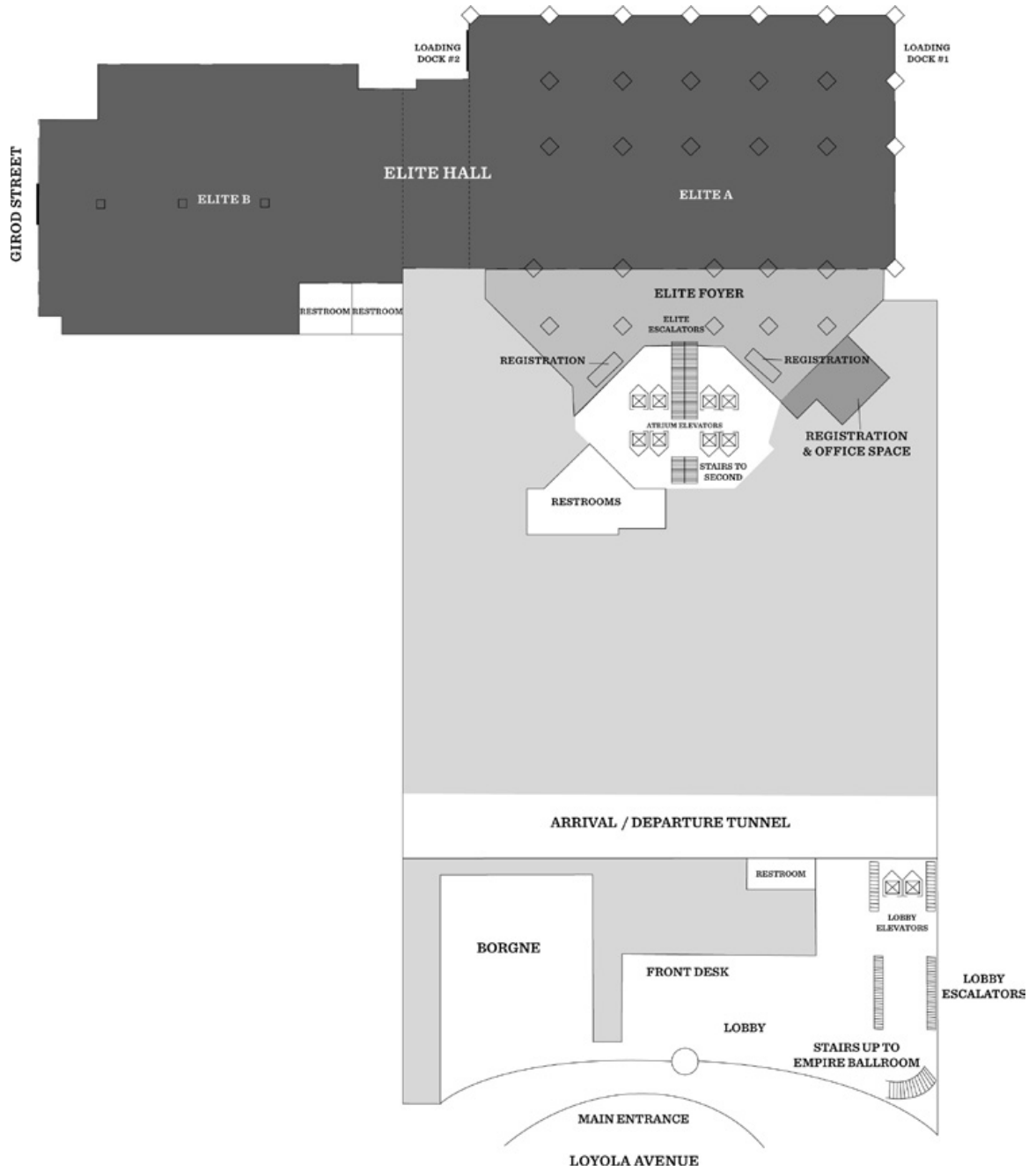

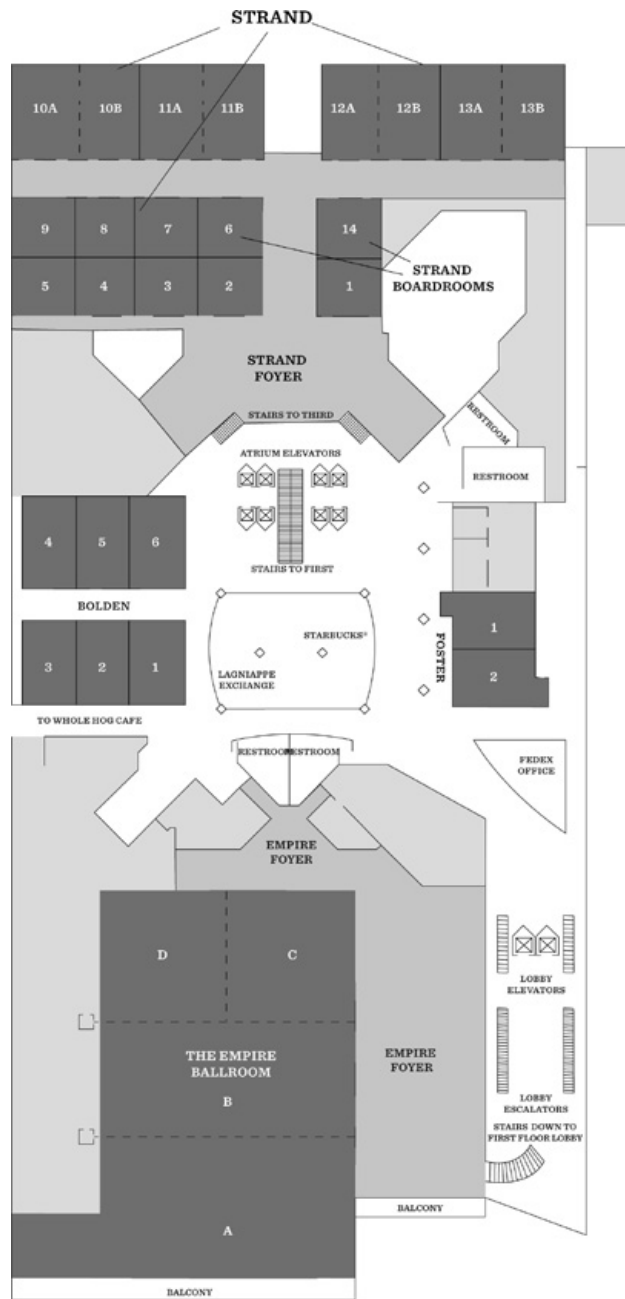

Level Two

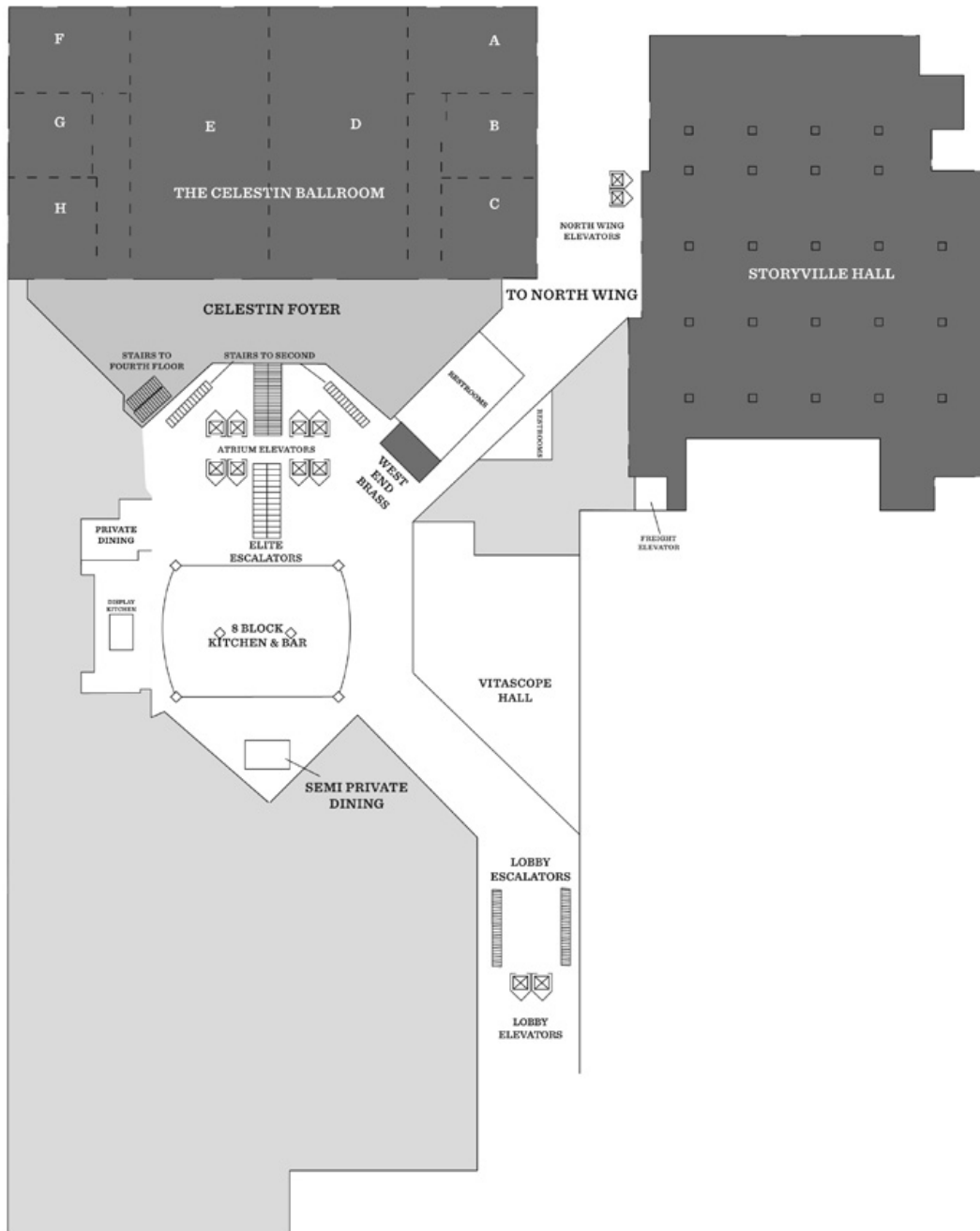

Level Three

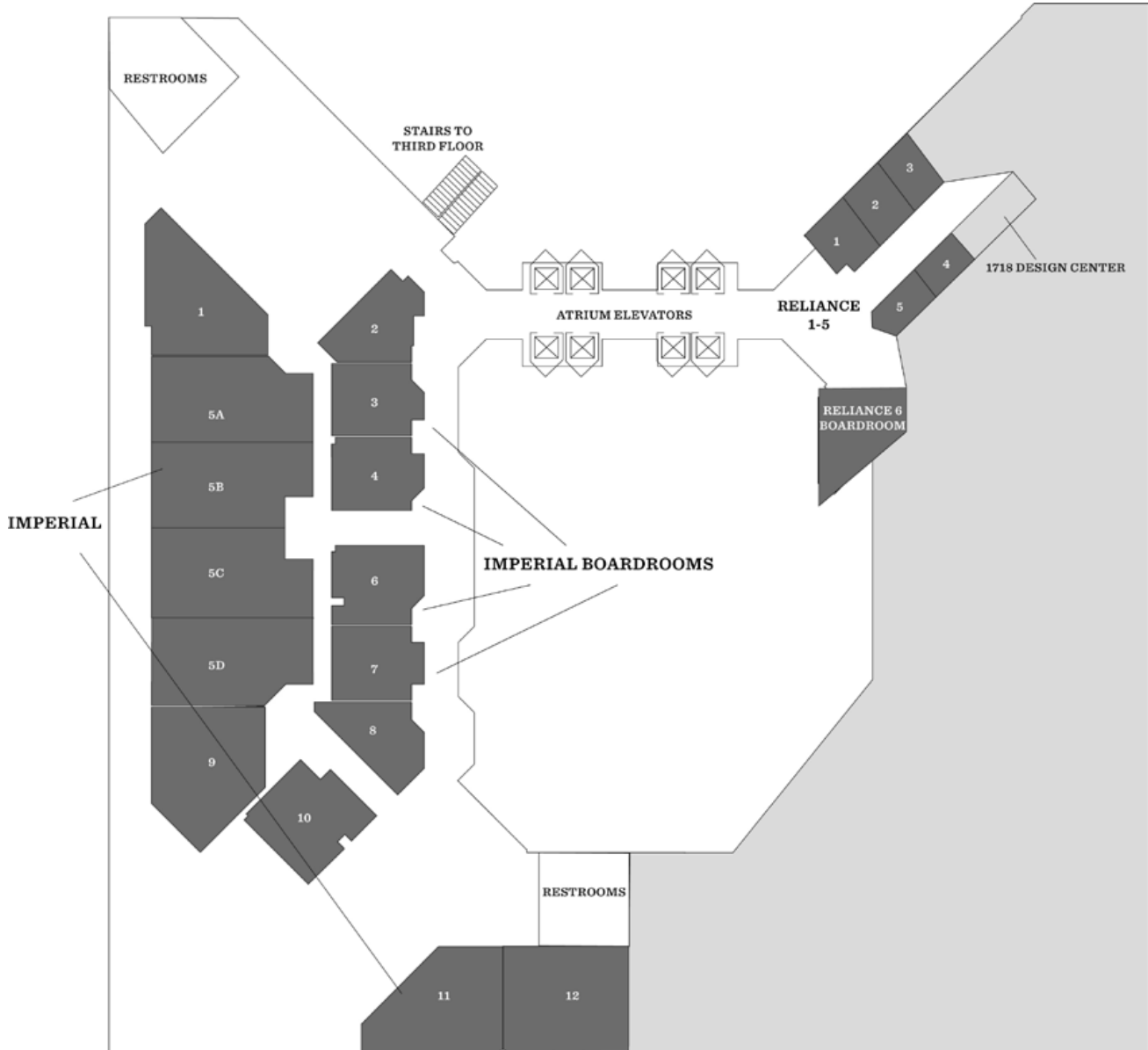

As director of survey research, Scott Keeter provides methodological guidance to all of the Pew Research Center's projects. His main appointment is in the Pew Research Center for the People & the Press, where he plays a leading role in setting overall direction for the center and guiding its research. Keeter helps to design survey projects, develop questionnaires and analyze data.

He is co-author of four books, including *A New Engagement? Political Participation, Civic Life, and the Changing American Citizen* (Oxford University Press), *The Diminishing Divide: Religion's Changing Role in American Politics*, (Brookings Institution Press), *What Americans Know about Politics and Why It Matters* (Yale University Press), and *Uninformed Choice: The Failure of the New Presidential Nominating System* (Praeger). His other published research includes articles and book chapters on survey methodology, political communications and behavior, and health care topics.

Keeter is past president of the American Association for Public Opinion Research. Since 1980 he has been an election night analyst of exit polls for NBC News, and has taught at George Mason University, Rutgers University and Virginia Commonwealth University.

APSA PRESIDENTIAL ADDRESS

Dr. John H. Aldrich

Duke University

President 2013 - 2014

John H. Aldrich is the Pfizer-Pratt University Professor of Political Science at Duke University. He received his BA from Allegheny College (1969; Gold Citation, 2009) and his MA (1971) and PhD (1975) from the University of Rochester (Distinguished Scholar Award, forthcoming, 2013), in Political Science. At Duke he has been department chair and was the founding director and then co-director (with professor Wendy Wood) of Duke's Social Science Research Institute. At Duke, he also received the inaugural Graduate Mentoring Award.

Aldrich's research has been centered mostly in American politics, but more recently, his work has become more comparative. His first book, *Before the Convention* (University of Chicago Press, 1980) assessed presidential nomination campaigns in the post-McGovern- Fraser era of primary-centered campaigning. His book *Why Parties?* (University of Chicago Press, 1995; 2011) won the Gladys Kammerer award in 1996. Since 1980, he has co-authored the *Change and Continuity* series on American elections (CQ Press), with Paul Abramson and David Rohde, and now being joined by Brad Gomez.

He has been actively involved in various survey research projects, including the American National Election Studies, where he currently serves as chair of its board, and is a member of the Planning Committee for the Comparative Study of Electoral Systems. An outgrowth of his work on the ANES is *Improving Public Opinion Surveys* (Princeton UP, 2012) which he co-edited with Kathleen McGraw. Aldrich co-authored "Foreign Policy and Voting in Presidential Elections" with Eugene Borgida and John Sullivan that won the Heinz Eulau award in 1990 for best article in the APSR.

Aldrich and David Rohde have studied the relationship among political parties, elections, and the Congress. This has led to a number of articles and chapters including ones that received the CQ Press Award (Legislative Studies Section, APSA) in 1966, and the Pi Sigma Alpha Award (SPSA), in 1997.

Aldrich is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and was a Fellow at the Center for Advanced Studies in the Social and Behavioral Sciences and at the Rockefeller Center, Bellagio. He was co-PI and then PI for a Summer Institute of Empirical Implications of Theoretical Models. He co-edited the *American Journal of Political Science*, chaired the APSA Task Force on Interdisciplinarity, has been a member of the APSA council and its secretary, and was president of the Southern and Midwest Political Science Associations.

Lawrence Dodd holds the Manning J. Dauer, Jr. Eminent Scholar Chair in Political Science at the University of Florida. He received his doctorate from the University of Minnesota in 1972.

Dodd's primary scholarly focus is the U. S. Congress. His work is concerned with identifying conditions conducive to congressional reform, organizational adaptation to new societal contexts, and innovative policymaking. In addressing these concerns he draws on rational choice theory, social structural analysis, social learning theory and theories of socio-cultural evolution.

The evolution of his perspective on Congress is charted in his book, *Thinking About Congress: Essays on Congressional Change* (Routledge, 2012). A review symposium on it can be found in the *Journal of Politics*, Volume 75, Issue 3, 2013. His other books on Congress include *Congress and the Administrative State* (with Richard Schott: John Wiley, 1979) and ten editions of *Congress Reconsidered* (co-edited with Bruce Oppenheimer: Praeger and CQ Press, 1977-2013). He is also co-editor with Cal Jillson of *The Dynamics of American Politics* (Westview, 1994) and *New Perspectives on American Politics* (CQ Press, 1994).

Dodd's ongoing effort to craft new theoretical lens through which to better understand the dynamic qualities of the Congress can be seen in his current work, *Congress in a Downsian World*, in progress. His current research on Congress, conducted in collaboration with Scot Schraufnagel, examines the role that party polarization and member incivility have played in fostering policy gridlock in Congress. This work explores the quantitative relationship between legislative conflict and landmark legislation from 1891 to 2012.

Dodd also has a strong interest in Comparative Politics. This interest generated an early 'game-theoretic' study of cabinet durability in European/British Commonwealth parliaments (*Coalitions in Parliamentary Government*, Princeton, 1976). More recently he has engaged in on-going research on democratization in Central America, with Leslie Anderson. This includes their multi-method study of electoral upheaval in post-revolutionary Nicaragua, which was based in part on nation-wide surveys from 1990 to 2001 (*Learning Democracy*, Chicago, 2005).

Dodd's scholarship and teaching have been enhanced by a Ford Foundation Fellowship, Congressional Fellowship, Hoover National Fellowship, Woodrow Wilson Center Fellowship and support from the National Science Foundation. In recognition of his contributions to research and teaching UF honored him as the 2007 Teacher/Scholar of the Year, its highest faculty honor. It has also honored him for his efforts at doctoral training, choosing him as one of five faculty members to receive the University's 2006-07 Award for Outstanding Doctoral Mentoring.

Dodd has served as President of the Southwest Political Science Association (1979-80) and chaired the Legislative Studies Section of the American Political Science Association (2007-09). He currently serves on the Editorial Board of the *American Political Science Review*. His research has been published in the *APSR*, *Journal of Politics*, *Comparative Political Studies*, *Polity*, *Journal of Democracy*, and other U. S. journals, and also in France, Spain and Latin America. Prior to joining UF he taught at the University of Texas-Austin (1972-1980), Indiana University-Bloomington (1980-1986), and the University of Colorado-Boulder (1986-1995).

Why has democratization occurred in some authoritarian countries (like some Middle Eastern countries during the Arab Spring)? Why has some authoritarian regimes been resilient (like China so far)? Some authoritarian regimes face challenges from popular protests and democratization movements. By contrast, some other authoritarian regimes are apparently immune from regime change. Although most of the human beings have historically and geographically lived under authoritarian rule, majority of the studies in political scientists have focused on politics in democratic countries. The papers in this "conference in the conference" try to fill this hole in political science. Interestingly, many authoritarian regimes have faced social unrest, and they have been democratized in some cases while they have survived in other cases. What explanations would account for this variation? To answer this question, the papers in the panels draw empirical evidence from China, the Middle East, and other authoritarian countries. Panel 1 focuses on how rulers manage political communication and information to maintain the authoritarian regime, Panel 2 focuses on how authoritarian rulers institutionalize governance for survival of the regime, and Panel 3 seek theoretical implications on comparative authoritarianism based on empirical evidence from China, Middle Eastern countries, and other authoritarian countries.

Rachael Woldoff discusses her book, winner of the 2013 Best Book Award from the Urban Affairs Association. Her work looks at the two-stage process of neighborhood transition: initial white flight followed by a transition from first-generation residents to second generation black residents. Woldoff describes the period of transition when white residents still remain, though in diminishing numbers, and a second, less discussed stage of racial change: black flight. She reveals what happens after white flight is complete: "Pioneer" blacks flee to other neighborhoods or else adjust to their new segregated residential environment by coping with the loss of relationships with their longer-term white neighbors, signs of community decline, and conflicts with the incoming second wave of black neighbors.

This panel explores how the internet has transformed electoral campaigns by comparing cases of three countries (Japan, South Korea, and the United States). Japan as well as South Korea has finally dropped restrictions on the use of the Internet as an election campaign tool. Lagged behind American and European counterparts, Japanese and Korean tech-savvy lawmakers and voters started to create more robust online political discussions during campaigns. Also, the deregulation of the internet use during the campaigns of the two nations may bring not only transformation of electoral systems of the two countries, but also other negative ramifications, namely high cost of campaign expenditures. Further, the new electoral rule may arguably promote Americanization of campaigns. "Americanization of campaigns" is the adaptation of certain characteristics of campaign elements and strategies, first developed in the United States. Those characteristics include the instrumental relationship between politics and media and the professionalization of election campaigns. Specifically, we focus on the following four aspects: (1) how the internet has promoted the Americanization of campaign process both in Japanese and Korean elections; (2) how information and communication technology companies has involved in the campaigns and what kind of new technologies has been implemented in Japanese and Korean, as well as American electoral competitions; (3) how outreach efforts organized by the major parties and/ or candidates have utilized internet and changed the way of mobilizations and galvanized demographic supports in three nations; (4) how ICT industry has benefited from the experience of applying their technology to the new electoral races. Uniqueness of this panel lies in the scope of comparison in four points. First, this panel sheds light on the comparison of the electoral communications between the two Asian developed countries and the United States. This Asian-US comparison provides more balanced perspectives to the ongoing discussions on American and/or European centered media-electoral nexus. Second, the methodologies employed in the studies of this group are varied from quantitative approaches to more qualitative ways, such as interviews, participant observations, and political ethnography. Third, analysis of new developments in elections across the Pacific finds a new horizon in the relationship between the ICT industry and society. Finally, this panel will synthesize each discussion and attempt to propose a more comprehensive model of comparative electoral across the Pacific.

Why has democratization occurred in some authoritarian countries (like some Middle Eastern countries during the Arab Spring)? Why has some authoritarian regimes been resilient (like China so far)? Some authoritarian regimes face challenges from popular protests and democratization movements. By contrast, some other authoritarian regimes are apparently immune from regime change. Although most of the human beings have historically and geographically lived under authoritarian rule, majority of the studies in political scientists have focused on politics in democratic countries. The papers in this “conference in the conference” try to fill this hole in political science. Interestingly, many authoritarian regimes have faced social unrest, and they have been democratized in some cases while they have survived in other cases. What explanations would account for this variation? To answer this question, the papers in the panels draw empirical evidence from China, the Middle East, and other authoritarian countries. Panel 1 focuses on how rulers manage political communication and information to maintain the authoritarian regime, Panel 2 focuses on how authoritarian rulers institutionalize governance for survival of the regime, and Panel 3 seek theoretical implications on comparative authoritarianism based on empirical evidence from China, Middle Eastern countries, and other authoritarian countries.

Why has democratization occurred in some authoritarian countries (like some Middle Eastern countries during the Arab Spring)? Why has some authoritarian regimes been resilient (like China so far)? Some authoritarian regimes face challenges from popular protests and democratization movements. By contrast, some other authoritarian regimes are apparently immune from regime change. Although most of the human beings have historically and geographically lived under authoritarian rule, majority of the studies in political scientists have focused on politics in democratic countries. The papers in this "conference in the conference" try to fill this hole in political science. Interestingly, many authoritarian regimes have faced social unrest, and they have been democratized in some cases while they have survived in other cases. What explanations would account for this variation? To answer this question, the papers in the panels draw empirical evidence from China, the Middle East, and other authoritarian countries. Panel 1 focuses on how rulers manage political communication and information to maintain the authoritarian regime, Panel 2 focuses on how authoritarian rulers institutionalize governance for survival of the regime, and Panel 3 seek theoretical implications on comparative authoritarianism based on empirical evidence from China, Middle Eastern countries, and other authoritarian countries.

Civil society is a key component of democratic governance. Following the rising importance of the sphere outside the market and the state in the era of globalization, as well as several academic works that showed the relationship between civic associationalism and institutional performance, civil society organizations have attracted many political scientists and sociologists. However, most of the studies on civil society are either normative or country/region-specific. In order to understand social and political functions of civil society organizations in comparative perspective, the Center for International, Comparative, and Advanced Japanese Studies (CAJS) at the University of Tsukuba, Japan, launched a project called Japan Interest Group Study (JIGS) in 1997. As of August, 2013, the CAJS has completed a series of survey on civil society organizations in fourteen countries (Japan, South Korea, the US, Germany, China, Russia, Turkey, the Philippines, Brazil, Bangladesh, Uzbekistan, Estonia, Poland, and India) and is conducting the survey in Thailand. The three papers of this panel engage in diverse empirical and theoretical questions on civil society organizations using the dataset of this original cross-national survey, which confirms the uniqueness of the JIGS project.

In the decade following the terror attacks of September 11, 2001, the United States engaged in a rapid reconstruction of the policy architecture surrounding emergencies and disasters in order to account for terrorism as a hazard. The analytic pragmatism of Robert Brandom is one of the most widely discussed approaches in contemporary American philosophy. A growing number of political theorists are turning to Brandom's work for insights into the contemporary circumstances of politics. Brandom's thought distinguishes itself by focusing on the proprietary features of language use. In saying something, Brandom stresses that we are also always doing something - namely, establishing relationships with others, creating mutual expectations about future behaviour, and owning the implications (if any) that logically follow from what is said. The result is a promising, analytically powerful reconstruction of communicative practices that has yet to be fully exploited in the study of politics. This panel seeks to highlight contributions using Brandom's approach to deepen our understanding of the practice of politics in democratic systems. Recent applications of Brandom's framework hint at some contributions already: Brandom's approach has been used to grasp when communication succeeds or breaks down in politics and why; to detect potential obstacles to communicating, including cross-cultural misunderstandings as well as more pernicious distortions of language, such as framing effects, deceptive and manipulative rhetoric, and partisan motivated reasoning; and, finally, to develop new criteria for measuring the quality of informal talk among politically active or less active citizens in everyday settings. Applying Brandom's approach to the study of politics raises a number of unexplored normative and empirical problems: Does rephrasing the findings from empirical political science and political psychology in terms of entitlements, commitments, and inferences, lead to a better understanding of how people communicate? For example, by rephrasing, can we better identify the consequences of framing effects and spell out their normative implications for communication, reasoning, and judgement? Attention to this issues also raises a number of unresolved pragmatic concerns about the consequences of conducting politics through language: Can the incentives to "win" campaigns, debates, and disagreements undermine the propriety of language use? What happens when emotional, figurative, and rhetorical speech leads actors to endorse commitments incompatible with their beliefs, interests, and values? What happens when actors are also lead to endorse competing sets of commitments? Finally, Brandom's approach leads to series of questions about political institutions, rules, and norms: Do different institutional environments cultivate distinct ways of using language? If so, how might institutional processes be designed to promote language aimed at agreement, compromise and consensus? And, how might institutions be designed to hedge against uses of language that veil intentions, sidestep commitments, and produce inferences that bypass rather than engage citizens' capacities for reasoning?
