This panel considers civil-military relations (CMR) from a multitude of perspectives. The panel is composed of a diverse set of scholars from across the globe and from a variety of institutions. Collectively, the panel challenges long-standing approaches to CMR research by reexamining canonical theoretical arguments and popular empirical assumptions about the conduct of CMR. Ben Sasson-Gordis reassesses the conventional wisdom among CMR scholars that "civilians have the right to be wrong" and instead argues military personnel have an obligation to eschew civilian orders that undermine democratic institutions. Genç Yılmaz confronts the widely-held assumption that militaries will actively push themselves into politics by instead showing how civilians "pull" the military into politics, with a special focus on Turkish civil-military relations. Kenwick, Kolcak, and Lee examine how veterans in the U.S. Congress differ in their use of rhetoric, testing popular assumptions about how military service matters for political elites. Muldoon pushes forward CMR theory by considering how the British military interacted with civil authorities in colonial society in India during WWII. Finally, Blankshain, Lupton, and Margulies reexamine the factors shaping confidence in the U.S. military, arguing that feminist attitudes are an important but unlooked factor driving confidence and support amongst the public.

This Roundtable will bring together a panel of established and promising scholars specializing in the origins of liberalism to critique Lee Ward's (Baylor University) new book Recovering Classical Liberal Political Economy: Natural Rights and the Harmony of Interests (Edinburgh University Press, 2022). This attempt to recover the rich, multifaceted dimension of British classical liberal political economy includes chapters on the political economy of Thomas Hobbes, John Locke, Bernard Mandeville, David Hume and Adam Smith, Thomas Paine, John Stuart Mill and a concluding chapter illuminating how British classical liberalism attempted (largely unsuccessfully) to address the problem of imperialism and the subjection of women. For decades, Ward's research has examined the philosophical foundations of the early modern liberal political thought. In his most recent book, and fourth monograph, Ward explores the most influential texts, thinkers, and concepts in the British tradition of classical political economy, and he argues that much of contemporary neo-liberal political economy is rooted in a problematic interpretation of classical liberalism in the early modern period. In this provocative theoretical reconstruction of 17th-19th century classical liberalism, Ward challenges the dominant interpretive paradigm established more than a generation ago by Albert Hirschman, C.B. Macpherson, J.G.A. Pocock and Louis Dumont which interprets the history of liberalism as a narrative about how early modern political economy made possible the emergence of homo economicus and the autonomy of economic discourse from the traditional moral categories of political philosophy. Uniquely among studies of this type, Recovering Classical Liberal Political Economy situates the political dimensions of early modern British political economy in two distinct, but related, strands of liberal thought often viewed in isolation-natural rights philosophy and harmony of interests theory. In Ward's rendering classical liberalism cannot be reduced to the laissez-faire doctrine, and rather must be understood in terms of a distinctly liberal conception of statecraft and practical reason. This Roundtable will be of interest to scholars and students of the history of liberalism, as well as the history of political economy. The participants in the Roundtable will include Peter McNamara (Arizona State University), Vincent Philip Muñoz (University of Notre Dame), Brianne Wolf (Michigan State University), and Constantine Vassiliou (University of Houston), with Lee Ward (Baylor University) as a respondent. This diverse group of scholars are all experts in the subject of the history of liberal political thought and political economy, who reflect a variety of methodological approaches and specific research foci. Given the continuing relevance of thinking about the challenges confronting liberal democratic states in the age of neo-liberal orthodoxy, political polarization, and economic globalization, the opportunity to assemble such as outstanding collection of scholars in this Roundtable promises to be a venue for a fruitful exchange of ideas and constructive dialogue that will benefit the author and the audience immensely as we reconsider our assumptions about the liberal theory of government and political economy.

What Is the Political South? Panel: Charles S. Bullock III - University of Georgia Ronald Keith Gaddie -University of Oklahoma Susan MacManus - University of South Florida Jeremy D. Mayer - George Mason University Mark J. Rozell - George Mason University The purpose of the panel is to gather these collaborators to report progress on a proposed book project on the evolution and diffusion of the political south. The south traditionally is presented as the eleven states of the former Confederacy, although significant portions of states bordering the south are often seen as more "southern" in their politics and culture than even some of the traditionally southern states such as Florida and Virginia. Furthermore, the US Census Bureau defines the south as inclusive of several MidAtlantic states. Thus, we raise the question: "what is the political south?" Has the transformation of much of the south economically, culturally, and politically made the region generally no longer distinctive? Will the children of the panelists' current students even be studying and taking classes on southern politics in the future? Or, is the concept of the political south merely encompassing a different geography than the traditional definition of the region? How should the political south be defined and analyzed in light of substantial change? We have authors with expertise in states that are portrayed by many as not authentically southern (FL, VA), or appearing to begin to transition politically and culturally (GA, TX), and of non-southern states that have a lot in common with the political south (OK, KY), among others. Our current thinking about this project is to have each author initially present a state-specific or subregional focus: Bullock (GA), MacManus (FL), Rozell (the key MidAtlantic region states - VA, MD, NC), Gaddie (OK, KY), and Mayer will describe and analyze the broader topic of "The Diffusion and Evolution of Southern Political Culture" based on polling data that reveal the least southern of the southern states, and the most "politically southern" outside the south, which will be inclusive of states not covered in the state and regional case studies. Four of the panelists since 2018 have collaborated on two book projects on the evolution of the south, black statewide candidates in the south, and have a nearly completed manuscript on rising minority and women's political power in the south. Gaddie is joining the collaboration for the proposed fourth project.

Western countries face a current era of ideological ferment and discontent, both expressed in popular and elite forms. This panel showcases papers on intellectuals, ideas, ideologies, and behaviors that have emerged in recent years, which are inchoate but growing in both variety and popularization. This is termed variously, with some coining such developments as a kind of 'postliberalism' or 'illiberalism,' while others prefer to reference 'dissident' strains on the Right and Left of the shifting ideological spectrum. The panel provides a look at postliberalism in several ways: as expressed through the curious rise of esoteric Catholic integralism and Old World Reaction (Patterson); as an ongoing theoretical and philosophical dispute between 'right-liberal' and 'postliberal' theoreticians (Addison); as a descriptor of a changing world order (Kochin); as a modern form of esoteric messianism known as 'accelerationism' (Ofek); and as a as cross-continental reaction of discontent expressed distinctly in the Anglo-American world and in places less fully captured by political and cultural liberalism (Waller). In doing so, the panel allows us to engage in theoretical, conceptual, and empirical discussions from a variety of perspectives, all seeking to better understand the ideational changes occurring across many states of the broader West.

This panel will bring together four articles exploring the theoretical foundations of political community. Peter Haskett (Catholic University of Washington D.C) will approach the topic by attempting to resolve the seeming contradiction between the Athenian Stranger's discussion of the tyrannical founder in Plato's Laws and the critique of tyranny in the Republic. This will speak to contemporary controversies regarding the importance of great founding figures, whether mythical or historical, to political communities. March Ashford (University of Concordia) will offer a divergent position, arguing that Socrates' travails at the hands of Athenian democracy in the Apology demonstrate that political communities are founded upon public opinion, with "great" figures either swept along or crushed under foot. Leaving the ancient world for the modern, Marcus Charlesworth (University of Ottawa) will turn to Heidegger's discussion of the relationship between politics and philosophy, making the case, employing Ernst Vollrath's die Politik- das Politische distinction, that Heidegger's thinker can not be a philosopher-king, and therefore philosophy can not provide a foundation for political community, because the thinker must occupy a complicated position, vacillating between die Politik and das Politische without becoming entangled in either. Finally, Ben Woodfinden (McGill University) will discuss Grant's Lament for a Nation, speaking to contemporary themes of continentalism, anti-Americanism, and oikophilia as competing foundations of contemporary Canadian political community. These four papers will interact with one another, putting into conversation contradictory positions on the political and ideational bases upon with political communities, both ancient and modern, construct and sustain themselves.

Public security, including internal conflict, violence, and policing, is a salient issue and an increasingly important topic in Comparative Politics literature. In this panel we discuss four topics of particular relevance to Latin America and the Global South. First, we engage in the discussion between citizens and the security forces. Albarracín and Tiscornia touch on how citizen trust in police forces in Colombia is affected by the perceived targets of police violence. Related to this topic, Tellez & Villamizar Chaparro examine the economic re-integration of ex-combatants following protracted internal conflict in Colombia. Our panel then focuses on how political competition is affected by public security issues. First, Trudeau provides a new theory of candidate-criminal collusion in Brazil, as a strategy employed by political elites to gain votes in criminally-governed territory. Also focusing on Brazil, Laterzo shows how political candidates engage in strategic issue mixing related to public security to maximize their chances of election. These four papers provide not only important theoretical and empirical contributions to the Comparative Politics literature, but also advance findings that are important to debates regarding democracy and public security policy-making globally.

This panel of scholars addresses a range of contemporary issues that have arisen within the field of International Studies that will impact their generation and those well beyond Gen-Z. Global forces unleashed in earlier eras have had unintended as well as anticipated consequences that are now threatening to push past weakening thresholds. Each of these papers wrestles with contested realms of freedom of choice within structures that have been resistant to changes that would generate more positive outcomes for a greater majority. Cameron Cheatham looks at how the degree of global financial power afforded to women may be a result of local patriarchal structures that limit women's fundamental human rights. Savannah Williams demonstrates how the depictions of women have reinforced gender stereotypes, thus thwarting the expansion of substantive equality even in Western societies. Shallbe Eubanks argues for a more progressive and transparent approach to pharmaceuticals and controlled substances which questions the motivation of Big Pharma and their corporate lobby. Quinna Eldridge brings much-needed attention to the widespread institutional abuse that occurs in foster care systems where bureaucratic boxchecking supersedes child welfare. Sayanna Bautista finds that community-based development is a more effective strategy for NGOs, but only if they are willing to partner with the local population to implement much-needed social programs. Cameron Cagle examines how short-sighted climate policies have impacted poor and at-risk communities and what might be done to turn the tide of global warming. Lastly, Gabriel Harper examines the degree to which Kazakhstan can exercise its autonomy in the sphere of Russian regional hegemony. Throughout each of these papers, the authors seek to frame how the structures created by more powerful forces have given rise to present injustices that more vulnerable groups must overcome in order to achieve a degree of agency sufficient to promote a more equitable and prosperous future.
