On this panel we plan to report the results of new cross-national surveys conducted in four democratic societies: the US, the UK, Poland, and Canada. The Political Communities Surveys are the first surveys of their kind in that their purpose is to delve deeply into citizens' perceptions of various relevant objects in their polities (political objects), such as their political authorities, their institutions, the workings of their political process, their regime principles, and their political communities. In addition, these surveys are designed to rigorously test a gamut of prominent theoretically relevant explanations for potential variations in political support and to examine a wide range of potential consequences. In this series of papers, we aim to focus specifically on citizens' perceptions of their respective governments' handling of the COVID-19 Pandemic and the various challenges that it introduced. We aim to do so much more extensively than has been done in the past and to do so cross-nationally in four different democratic societies – the US, the UK, Poland and Canada (n=9,200). In addition, we plan in these papers to account for people's different lived experiences and varying dispositions over the course of the pandemic and investigate how such evaluations affected their overall democratic support (both evaluative and affective) for different political objects.

As the 2024 US presidential election approaches, China is once again thrust into the spotlight of American politics, with an increasing number of politicians from across the aisle playing the "China Card." Despite attempts by both Washington and Beijing to warm up their icy relations, systematic competition continues to persist. On the US side, the establishment of the House Select Committee on the Chinese Communist Party signifies a bipartisan agreement on adopting a firm stance towards China. On the Chinese side, Xi Jinping has expedited military reforms and is building a geopolitical clique with Central Asian states as a countermeasure to the so-called US-led "Anti-China Alliance." In this dynamic, a significant player is Taiwan, whose assertion of independent identity has grown considerably following the 2019-2020 Hong Kong protests, the 4th Taiwan Strait Crisis, and a series of other Chinese aggressions. While Taiwan has bolstered its self-defense capabilities and worked on better integration into the global supply chain, it has also retained the option of peaceful dialogue with China as a buffer. Notably, the outcome of Taiwan's 2024 presidential election is likely to substantially shape its post-Covid China policy, introducing complexities and uncertainties to the dynamics of US-China-Taiwan relations. This panel values research that involves comparisons before and after pivotal "critical junctures" in US-China-Taiwan relations in recent years, the interplay between domestic politics and foreign policy, and intricate interactions between politicians and citizens. The panel welcomes a diverse range of methodological approaches and theoretical paradigms that delve into different facets of the panel theme.

Aristotle claims that political science is the science that has as its goal the human good, and thus human flourishing. Beyond the pragmatic management of the state, the proper domain of the political scientist is the care for the citizens' acquisition of moral knowledge and moral conditioning. As such, the work of the political scientist, for Aristotle, is unavoidably ethical work. But this expanded understanding of political science raises difficult questions about how exactly these two apparently distinct realms are related: Does one ground the other? Do the methods of the practice of political science differ from those of ethics? To what degree should both ethics and political science be collaborative endeavors? And to what degree should the complicating forces of luck and nature be acknowledged in these two realms? The papers included in this Ancient Perspectives on Moral Knowledge and Political Science panel aim to present research and foster a conversation around the Ancient Greek understanding of the interwoven nature of ethics and political science, investigating the aforementioned questions and many more related ones. Nicolas Day's paper "Protarchus' Second Sailing in Plato's Philebus" asks which are the appropriate methods for the inquiry into the human good. Through a close reading of Plato's Philebus, he argues that a comprehensive analysis of the class character of reality can't be a precondition for an investigation into the human good. Rather, a preliminary decision about the nature of that good must presuppose any further inquiry into its nature. Jeffrey Patrick Colgan's paper "Lucky by Nature? Luck in Aristotle's Eudemian and Nicomachean Ethics" investigates the role that luck plays in human flourishing. By comparing the treatment of luck in two of Aristotle's treatises and situating luck in relation to nature and the divine, he complicates the way previous scholarship has made political use of Aristotle's treatment of luck and contests the often clumsy ways that luck has been accommodated in political systems. Finally, Stephen Cunniff's paper "What Are Friends Good For? Aristotle on Friendship, Self-Knowledge, and the Joint-Exercise of Virtue" examines the role of friendship in the cultivation of virtue and the pursuit of the good, arguing that friendship serves as an important joint-exercise of virtue grounded in mutual self-knowledge.

Panel on the new book, Supreme Bias: Gender and Race in U.S. Supreme Court Confirmation Hearings, released in October 2023 from Boyd, Collins, and Ringhand. Book Summary: In Supreme Bias, we examine the dynamics of gender and race at the Supreme Court confirmation hearings held before the Senate Judiciary Committee. The book uses extensive new data and qualitative evidence to highlight how the women and people of color who have sat before the Committee have faced a significantly different confirmation process than their white male colleagues. Despite being among the most qualified and well-credentialed lawyers of their respective generations, our evidence indicates that female nominees and nominees of color face more skepticism of their professional competence, are subjected to stereotype-based questioning, are more frequently interrupted, and are described in less-positive terms by senators.

Richard Franklin Bensel's The Founding of Modern States is a bold comparative work that examines the dilemmas of foundings in three democratic and three non-democratic states: Britain, the US, France, the Soviet Union, Nazi Germany, and the Islamic Republic of Iran. Bensel argues that new state formations are defined by a metaphysical conception of a 'will of the people' through which the new state is ritually granted sovereignty. The paradoxical nature of modern foundings is embedded in their constitutive moments and in the political myths each regime derives to justify their claim to represent the people's will. Bensel is one of the foremost experts on American political development, but book engages with core debates in not just this subfield but also in comparative politics and political theory. The "critics" and Daragh Grant – each bring a similarly APD and cross-subfield sensibility to their work, as well as a close attention to the role of ideology and myths in constructing political regimes. Robert Mickey (University of Michigan) is an expert on democratic institutions, subnational authoritarianism, and the US South. His current research includes a study of comparative nation-building. Gwendoline Alphonso (Fairfield University) is a scholar of American political development, political parties, legal history, and the politics of the family. Daragh Grant (University of Chicago) studies the history of colonialism and empire, the history of slavery, and the development of understandings of sovereignty and subjecthood from the sixteenth century to the present.

How did Renaissance political thinkers conceive of the relationship between sovereignty, power, political psychology, and institutional forms? How did their divergent understandings of relations between the people and the elites, as well as the institutions that mediated those relationships, shape their visions of political rule? The early sixteenth century provided a variety of political models and institutional frameworks to which humanist thinkers could turn in developing their accounts of power, authority, legitimacy, conflict, and institutional design. This panel seeks to investigate the political writings of Niccolò Machiavelli, Francesco Guicciardini, Jean Calvin, and other legal and public humanists, exploring the diverse contexts and authorial strategies that shaped their writings on political rule and institutional design within the Renaissance state. Our first paper explores Machiavelli and Guicciardini's responses to the wave of popular apocalypticism, religious reform, and institutional transformation that characterized Florence's 'Savonarolan Moment' from 1494 to 1498. Our second paper investigates Calvin's engagement with French humanist thinking on the psychology of political rule, as well as the role of philosophic counsel and popular institutions in cultivating effective restraints on royal power. Our third paper positions Machiavelli's discussion of popular power as a radical critique of humanist legal theorists who sought to reconcile absolutist government with the concept of popular sovereignty. Finally, our fourth paper seeks to explore the evolution of Guicciardini's thought concerning the promises and perils of aristocratic and popular rule amidst the profound instability that afflicted contemporary Florence.

# Author Meets Critics - Samuel Bagg's The Dispersion of Power: A Critical Realist Theory of Democracy

This panel is an author-meets-critics session focusing on Samuel Bagg's newly released book. The Dispersion of Power: A Critical Realist Theory of Democracy The book is an urgent call to rethink centuries of conventional wisdom about what democracy is, why it matters, and how to make it better. Drawing from history, social science, psychology, and critical theory, it explains why elections do not and cannot realize the classic ideal of popular rule, and why prevailing strategies of democratic reform often make things worse. Instead, Bagg argues, we should see democracy as a way of protecting public power from capture - an alternative vision that is at once more realistic and more inspiring. Despite their many shortcomings, real-world elections do prevent the most extreme forms of tyranny, and are therefore indispensable. In dealing with the vast inequalities that remain, however, we cannot rely on standard solutions such as electoral reform, direct democracy, deliberation, and participatory governance. Instead, Bagg shows, protecting and enriching democracy requires addressing underlying inequalities of power directly. In part, this entails substantive policies attacking the advantages of wealthy elites. Even more crucially, deepening democracy requires the organization of oppositional, countervailing power among ordinary people. Neither task is easy, but historical precedents exist in both cases — and if democracy is to survive contemporary crises, leaders and citizens alike must find ways to revive and reinvent these essential democratic practices for the 21st century.

The group of papers on this panel aims to expand and disrupt narratives of Black political participation in the United States. Black American political participation through queer to normative American political behavior is still boxed and not fully explored or considered heterogenous in political behavior. The first two papers in the panel emphasize the influences of Black political behavior. Best, in her exploration of the influence of police behavior on Black women's political behavior, finds that police misconduct is a mechanism for voter turnout. Babalola, using his colonial heritage influence theory, analyzes how colonial legacies impact the political behavior of Black folks in the United States. In the third paper, Roberson explores the relationship between racial resentment and labor union support, using ANES data that indicators of racial resentment and Black uplift are deeply tied to support for labor unions. In the final paper, Crawford theorizes how a politic of the otherwise opens up nonnormative ways to understand rural Black political participation. Overall, this panel highlights how the changing political landscape of the U.S. requires that we also change how we approach Black political participation.

These three papers look at individual voters in democracy and what problems they face. The first paper interacts with proponents who argue that we should not participate in politics. These individuals claim that because we cannot make a difference in politics then we should not participate in it. However, the author of this paper argues that they may be right about national politics but not about local politics for a variety of reasons. The second paper argues that certain institutional changes would neither address rational ignorance nor produce comparatively better policy outcomes. This is because citizens and decision-makers in these new institutions will still face strong incentives to behave in certain ways based on their social identities. The last paper argues When we vote, we send signals about which candidate or political party we support. By and large, the signals of voters are the only signals represented in election results. However, there's reason to think that non-voters are sending signals that are just as important. The author argues that there is untapped political value in discerning what non-voters are signaling.

In the United States, politics has become increasingly nationalized in recent years as voter decisionmaking is now driven by partisan or national political forces rather than the attributes of individual candidates. Indeed, voters now seem more concerned with which of the two national parties will be in power across all levels of government as opposed to which candidate will represent them individually. The phenomenon has now reached levels unseen since the nineteenth century, when the party ballot was in use and voters were generally unable to select among individual candidates. Nationalized Politics asks and answers the question, "how has nationalization influenced elections across different political eras?" Jamie Carson, Joel Sievert, and Ryan Williamson look at historical variation in nationalization through an analysis of congressional elections from 1840 to 2020. By examining roughly 180 years of elections, the authors leverage considerable differences in electoral competition, electoral rules, nationalization, polarization, and partisan advantage via the incumbency advantage. Moreover, Carson, Sievert, and Williamson employ a unique survey design to capture citizen attitudes toward the nationalization of politics to further consider the question of how nationalization is currently shaping politics. Providing a comprehensive history of US congressional elections, Nationalized Politics illustrates the roots of the current electoral landscape in the US.

Administering Justice examines the leadership role of chief justices in the American states, including how those duties require chief justices to be part of the broader state political environment. Vining and Wilhelm focus extensively on the power of chief justices as public spokespersons, legislative liaisons, and reform leaders. In contrast to much existing research on chief justices in the states, this study weighs their extrajudicial responsibilities rather than intracourt leadership. Vining and Wilhelm analyze the reform agendas advanced by chief justices and determine what factors influence the likelihood of success. These analyses confirm that chief justices engage with state politics in meaningful ways and that reactions to their proposals are influenced by ideological congruence with other political elites and the scope of their requests. Administering Justice also examines the chief justice position as an institution, provides a collective profile of its occupants, and surveys growing diversity among court leaders.

Although nation and empire are often cast as opposing political forms, the relationship between the two can be far from straightforward. The tension between national self-assertion and imperial domination, between self-rule and rule over others, can become particularly salient in those states whose images of themselves are centrally tied to claims of popular sovereignty: democratic Athens in antiquity, Britain in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, the United States from its inception down to the present. These dilemmas become still more pressing when such states are enmeshed in global economic structures with murky relationships to national publics. The four papers on this panel investigate the imbrications of nation and empire across a wide range of historical cases. Mark Fisher looks at the tension between the "democratic" and "autocratic" interpretations of ancient Athens in the work of Thucydides. Jacob Swanson excavates Alexander Hamilton's writings on public debt, which served simultaneously as a vehicle for American domestic political development and for American assertion on the international stage. Anurag Sinha investigates the politics of commodity boycotts in the hands of both the British Empire and later its Indian nationalist opponents. Emma Stone Mackinnon examines the American statesman Ralph Bunche's attempts to navigate the tensions between his critique of imperialism and his acceptance of moderate forms of managed transition that preserved aspects of colonial hierarchy.

What is understood by judicial activism in different jurisdictions? Beyond a superficial agreement, are we talking about the same phenomenon across countries and systems (or over time), and to what extent? This roundtable introduces a new book that started right here at the SPSA: Judicial Activism in Comparative Perspective. A first book in a new series on comparative law and courts, the book brings together a selection of theoretical and empirical studies across different socio-political and institutional contexts. The chapters not only demonstrate the complexity of the concept, but also illustrate the different meanings of judicial activism across different types of political regimes, legal systems, and judicial institutions. The book looks at three examples from western democracies with common law systems (the U.S., the U.K., and Canada), and then at six examples from civil law systems in Latin American countries with very different experiences with judicial activism, democracy, and liberal constitutionalism: Brazil, Colombia, Costa Rica, Mexico, Paraguay, and Venezuela. These case studies are analyzed with reference to a common conceptual framework, assisted by a beginning theoretical essay and two concluding crossnational studies highlighting different theoretical and methodological approaches. The roundtable will gather the co-editors and six contributors to the volume, presenting and discussing the series, the book and a selection of individual chapters.

Can we do politics well without manipulating and expressing anger, shame, or other strong emotions? If we could, would emotionless or "positivity only" politics even be desirable? The so-called negative emotions like anger, fear, terror, hate, or resentment seem to play a positive role in human survival. They help us anticipate and avoid situations that threaten our life and health. When we cannot avoid life-threatening situations, these "negative" emotions stimulate us to hide, flee, or fight effectively. COVID-19 disproportionately affected older people. Part of the reason was inherent in the virus, but it was also because of the way many societies treated older people, with nursing homes often hotspots of infection. This disproportionate impact on older people also meant that the public health measures of 2020-2021 meant, in effect, that younger people were sacrificing work, education, and enjoyment in older to protect older people. Meanwhile, public health measures often condemned older people to the loss of social support networks. In few recent political debates have the implications and impact of age and ageing politics been so important- or so tangled and obscure. Early in the pandemic, there was an efflorescence of interest in the interaction between ageing, politics, and the pandemic, but since then there have been few efforts to draw lessons about the political status of older people in rich countries. We do not yet have stable answers to basic questions about what caused different approaches to managing COVID-19's impact on older people or what it tells us about the politics of ageing societies. This panel asks what we learned about the politics of ageing from COVID-19: What political power do older people have? How do we understand the impact of COVID-19 on nursing homes and eldercare facilities in different countries? Above all, what have we learned about the status of older people in politics today? The round table is made up of experts in comparative health and ageing policy, and will take an explicitly international and comparative perspective with a strong focus on the United States' experience. All five have published extensively on ageing, health policy, and COVID-19. The goal is to synthesise lessons from different US and international experiences and suggest directions for future research.

Traditionally demagogy is understood negatively, and political scientists narrowly approach the phenomenon in order to suppress and condemn it. Charles Zug's foundational work breaks with this longstanding tradition. Not only does he argue that our negative conception of demagogy impairs our ability to objectively investigate demagogy, potentially blinding us from fully, or even satisfactorily, comprehending the phenomenon, but he also pushes us to accept a degree of demagogy. He even makes the provocative argument that our founding fathers made constitutional room for demagogy, when constructing our government and the norms that would surround it. In his view, the negative scholarly bias puts too high of a moral burden on politics and prevents us from seeing how demagogy may be used in salutary ways to better serve and even save democracy.
